History is happening everyday around us. Living in Conifer makes it easy to see that. If you have only lived here 1 year, you can already say, "I remember what King's Valley looked like before the new King's Valley Marketplace was built." If you have lived here 5 years, you talk about "where the old Safeway was located." And if you have lived here 10 years, you know what it was like before highway 285 was widened. See, you're already an 'old timer' with memories of the history of Conifer.

And that is the mission of the Conifer Historical Society and Museum (CHSM). We endeavor

to capture the history of the local area. Our immediate focus is conducting oral histories.

What is Oral History? It is the stories your parents and grandparents told you and you now wish you had recorded. We sit down with a video camera and interview people, asking them questions. What are your earliest memories of Conifer? Where did you buy groceries when there was no supermarket here yet? How long did it take to drive to Denver before the highway was improved? We have the technology to record these memories for future generations and believe strongly that the stories of the

lumber mills, rough roads and wild animals will become increasingly valuable with time.

In addition to oral histories captured in one-on-one interviews, CHSM has held two Armchair Adventure evenings, partnering with the Mountain Area Land Trust (MALT). These delightful evenings featured longtime local residents relating their memories of Conifer.

The 2007 Armchair Adventure starred Bob Kuehster, Betty Fields Long, Jack Antweiler, Lucille Tanner and Norm Meyer. If you are a recent citizen of the area, it is possible you don't recognize these names. But if you pay attention to local landmarks and lore, you will see that these names are integral to our history.

Have you driven up Kuehster Road, located at the east end of Pleasant Park Road? Do you know where the Long Brother's Garage is located at King's Valley? Have you ever taken a hike through Meyer Ranch Park? You certainly have driven by Jack Antweiler's family homestead along Blue Creek Road, off highway 73. Sadly, Jack passed

away in July 2008. The good news is that Jack's memories of growing up on the family homestead have been preserved for posterity along with memories of the others on a DVD created by CHSM.

The 2008 Armchair Adventure entitled *Growing Up in Conifer* starred Yvonne Cooper Ludwig, Erv Knight, Frank Blakeslee and Norm Meyer's children Sharon, Cara and Norm, Junior. These current and former Conifer residents grew up here, all attending a one room school at one time or another and all having Phebe Granzella as a teacher. You don't know who Phebe was? Granzella Road, near Meyer Ranch Park, is named for her husband's family. Phebe was possibly the most famous teacher Conifer ever has had and now that you've heard her name, you will likely notice it more frequently.

While watching this DVD you will laugh as Yvonne recounts growing up in a log cabin off Pleasant Park Road and marveling at the flush toilets she first encountered at the brand new West Jefferson Elementary School. "We were all so proud to go to a new school in 1956," she remembers.

Erv Knight recalls when there were only 3 families living on Conifer Mountain.

Frank Blakeslee, who grew up in the log cabin located on Meyer Ranch, said there were so few families living in the area when he was a child that the entire school would only have 15 children and that included all the families from Shaffer's Crossing to the other side of Double Header.

Each of the Meyer children also related their memories of attending both the Conifer School on Barkley Road and the Pleasant Park School. Their dad Norm was a pilot for Continental Airlines and yet they also had a working cattle ranch. Their mom swore the cows always got out onto the highway whenever Norm was away for a few days. Norm Junior made a point explaining how rutted the road to Evergreen was and what a big deal it used to be to travel that far over that rough road.


