Isham Jones Road, northwest of Shaffers Crossing, is named for the famous orchestral leader.

[Isham Jones](#) (1894-1956), a famous early 20th century composer and orchestral leader, spent the World War II years living north of Shaffers Crossing. There is even a road named in his honor in the area where he lived.

Jones is most famous for his song, *It Had to Be You*, written in 1924. He wrote the melody, while Gus Kahn wrote the lyrics. We're sure you know it.

Isham helped his brother run the general store at Shaffers Crossing while living in Colorado. After the war ended, Isham moved to California.

A Letter to the Community

CHSM is pleased to announce that it has chosen [Gerou & Associates, Ltd.](#) to conduct a Historic Structure Assessment of the Norm Meyer home on US 285 in Conifer. Funded by a noncompetitive grant from the State Historical Fund and monies donated by community members for the project, the Historic Structure Assessment is a first step in helping CHSM to determine whether a public museum is a viable use for the Meyer home.

A proposal from Gerou and Associates was chosen from a field of six architectural firms in a competitive bid process to answer the following major questions:

- What will it take to bring the Meyer home up to code standards for public use?
- Is the structure sound, including exterior and interior structural systems, roofing and waterproofing, windows, doors, interior finishes, and foundations?
- What is the state of the mechanical, plumbing, foundation, and electrical systems?
- What hazardous materials, if any, are in the home and will need to be removed?
- What zoning, building code, and accessibility issues will need to be addressed?
- How will public restrooms, parking, and other issues be addressed?



- What will be the estimated cost of construction and renovation?

A team of highly skilled and dedicated members of the Conifer Historical Society and Museum deliberated for many weeks before awarding the opportunity to Gerou and Associates from a field of seven bidding architectural firms. The firms had received Requests for Proposals from the Conifer Historical Society and Museum as part of a competitive process initiated in January.

A full service architectural firm located in Evergreen, Gerou and Associates has rich experience statewide in historic needs assessments and historic preservation, including local historic preservation projects related to the Evergreen Lake Warming House, the Church of the Transfiguration/St. Marks in Evergreen, the Humphrey Memorial Park and Museum, the Central City Masonic Lodge, and the Hiwan Barn. Principals Phil and Cheri Gerou have lived in the area for more than 25 years and performed

architectural work in Colorado for more than 35 years. They are active members of the mountain community, donating time and service to numerous local boards and organizations. Phil Gerou will lead and manage the project, as Cheri's current role as a Colorado State Representative prohibits her involvement on projects receiving state funding.

Having chosen the architectural firm, CHSM is now ready to submit the noncompetitive grant proposal to the State Historical Fund requesting funds for the Historic Structure Assessment. It is anticipated that funding will be approved by June, and project work will be conducted throughout the summer and fall. A Historic Structures Assessment report from Gerou and Associates will be submitted to CHSM and the State Historical Fund by December 2011, with time allowed for questions and answers from the Historical Society and State Historical Fund.

We are grateful for the community's support in this exciting project, and hope you will continue to offer your suggestions, ideas, financial support and volunteer time as we work together to find out if the Meyer home will one day become the museum home for the Conifer Historical Society and Museum!

Bradford Junction and the Yellow Barn. Bradford Junction was the intersection of two toll roads that met at the Yellow Barn. This small community later became known as Conifer. In addition to a brief history of Bradford Junction, we will also enjoy the stories of family members who lived at the Yellow Barn property in the middle of the 20th century.

An Evening with Abraham Lincoln. This year marks the 150th anniversary of the beginning of the Civil War. In this Chautauqua-style program, Abraham Lincoln will speak to us and answer questions from the audience.
